### Hannah Rantoul papers, 1819-1909, bulk 1840-1895

#### **Abstract:**

The Hannah Rantoul papers measure 3 linear feet and date from 1819-1909. Hannah Rantoul, 1821-1898, was the youngest child of Robert Rantoul and Joanna Lovett Rantoul. The bulk of the papers are letters Hannah received in her lifetime. Also included are items that Hannah collected like newspaper clippings and fliers. Hannah Rantoul was an Associate Manager for the U.S. Sanitary Commission during the Civil War and records and letters from the work done by Beverly women during the war is included in the papers as well as letters from local soldiers.

#### **Provenance:**

The papers were given to the Society in the 1920s by the Endicott family. Hannah Rantoul's papers are part of the larger Robert Rantoul papers collections.

#### **Processor's Note:**

Materials were in folders and boxes, but not organized very thoroughly. After taking an inventory of items, letters were divided into family and non-family series. Hannah Rantoul made notes on most letters and envelopes as to the identity of the correspondent, dates, and any additional information she felt needed noting. At some time all letters were removed from their envelopes and placed in separate boxes. Every attempt to reunite letters and envelopes has been made; any unidentifiable envelopes have been placed in separate folders.

**Biographical Note:**

Hannah Rantoul, 1821-1898, was the youngest child of Robert Rantoul Sr. and Joanna (Lovett) Rantoul. She was born in Beverly, Ma and resided in Beverly her entire life in the family home on Washington Street which she inherited at the time of her father's death in 1858. Hannah never married nor had any children. She was an active member in the community, and during the Civil War she served as Associate Manager for the U.S. Sanitary Commission for the city of Beverly.

The bulk of Hannah's correspondence is with her family, but there is a good amount from friends as well. The largest grouping of letters is from her friend Anne W. Abbot, the daughter of Beverly minister Abiel Abbot. Abiel Abbot was minister of the First Parish Church from 1803-1828, and Anne and Hannah would have met as young girls. The Abbot family left Beverly for Cambridge after the death of Abiel in 1828, but Anne and Hannah's friendship survived. The earliest dated letter is from 1860 although a great bulk of the letters is undated. There are references to Anne coming to the Rantoul house for tea in other letters dating from the 1830s and 40s.

**Scope and Content Note:**

The collection is mostly letters Hannah received through out her life. In a few instances, there are a few draft letters that Hannah wrote to others. The letters begin in 1830 and extend through the 1890's. The bulk of the earlier material includes letters between her immediate family members and her friends from school as well as neighbors. By the 1850s Hannah is receiving letters from a wider range of family relations as well as friends and acquaintances. The bulk of the letter are from family members, Hannah kept close ties with her siblings children and received letters from them and their spouses and eventually their children throughout her life. A bulk of the materials from the 1898-1890s is letter from her young grand nieces and nephews. She was affectionately referred to by the family as Aunt Hannah.

Besides her family there is a strong presents of letters from her childhood friends, but as they grew up, married, and left Beverly these letter wane. The largest lot of letters from a non-family member is from Anne W. Abbott, who was the daughter of the Beverly minister Abiel Abbott of the First Parish Church, most of the letters are undated, but the dated letters start in 1860 and extend until the 1890s.

In addition to the letters Hannah received the collection includes records of her work during the Civil War. Hannah was an Associate Manager of the U.S. Sanitary Commission. In the collection are records of donations kept by Hannah, printed materials of the national U.S. Sanitary Commission, as well as the letters of receipt of donated goods from the Boston branch of the organization. Also there is an assortment of letter from Beverly soldiers and some war memorabilia such as confederate money.

The last series is a collection of memorabilia and ephemera that Hannah collected through out her life. Specifically there are newspaper clippings, booklets of poems, autographs, and flowers, and

**Content List:****Series I: Letters from Relations, 1828-1909, bulk 1830-1895 (2 boxes, 1 linear foot)****Series Note:**

This series is comprised of letters Hannah received from her family members. Most of the letters discuss the goings on of the family, visiting, and trips. Some topical folders like the letter of sympathy are included in this series. The letters of sympathy was an existing grouping of letters and it is unclear who grouped them so they have been kept together and most of the letter are from non- relations. The folder of items relating to the death of Robert Rantoul includes telegrams, copies of resolutions from a town meeting, and a newspaper clipping in tribute to Robert Rantoul, Jr. There is no folder of letters from Robert Rantoul Jr. to Hannah, but a few of the letters in his wife, Jane E. Rantoul, included letters signed by both Jane and Robert. The last folder in the series, items not addressed to Hannah, are letter to other family members that have ended up in Hannah's papers. Besides the many Endicott letters there is also a few folders of more distant relatives, like Rev. A. P. Peabody and his daughter Mary. Most of the letters from her later years are from her many grand nieces and nephews thanking her for visits and for gifts they received.

### Series II: Letters from Non-Relations, 1819-1895 (2 boxes, 1 linear foot)

#### Series Note:

This series starts with folders of letters sorted by decade and then extends to folders of letter from particular persons. The letters span Hannah's life time, but start with her friends from childhood and then continue on to her adult relationships. The bulk of letters are from Elizabeth (Abbot) Bowditch, Elizabeth (Woodberry) Story, and Anne Wales Abbot. These women were close friends of Hannah's and their letters are the most personal in the collection.

John P. Lyman was not a family member, but did marry a cousin of Hannah's, Mary Rantoul Peabody (sister of Rev. A. P. Peabody). Letters from the Lyman's have been kept in the non- relations series. Some highlights in this series are: letters in referencing the Great Chicago fire of 1870 from Emily Bullard, Frank and Charles Vaughan's accounts from ship sailing around Samaria,
